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Chairman of Trustees Report

In the absence of travel to Africa, which may continue for some months or years, we have learned that the technology available can assist us greatly with education sharing with colleagues in Africa. It is an expensive way to move forwards, but the only possibility at present. Although the caveat exists which says that on any given day or hour, the signal strength and reliability of the internet service in the region is not a given. After the June conference which we held, we heard from a number of colleagues that they had been unable to get an internet signal to hear the sessions live. The fortunate way in which these events are handled, means that the sessions are recorded and may be accessed for up to a year after the event. We have chosen to only make them available for a month, as stimulation to access them soon goes away after the day. This next conference we are holding we have chosen two months 'catch –up' as Christmas occurs shortly after the conference, goes out live. The important thing we have learned over time is that teaching adults is different from teaching children. Adults have pre-conceived ideas which may or may not be correct and in order for nursing practice to change, some ideas need to be challenged and rationale for new practice available with reference to research or fact. Andragogy implies the learner is using elements of self direction in order to facilitate their learning process.

It is also true that individuals learn best using a style. These have been described as visual learning, auditory learning and kinesthetic or tactile learning. Visual learners, of which I am one, learn in

pictures, preferring to see facts written down in a handout or on a slide. FoAN has learned that many of the generation of learners we are helping in Africa, like videos not only to break up the incessant powerpoints but they learn well from a video. The auditory learners like to learn through lectures and discussions and like group work. The kinesthetic learners are those who like best to touch and feel and by experiencing that which they are trying to learn. Many of the concepts which we are passing on to African learners are tricky to teach in this way but are sometimes requested by the students. Sessions held during an e-conference are unlikely to hold all the references which the speaker has looked at although many do provide a list as a final slide for others to review after the presentation. Some of the presenters we have chosen to enrich our conferences are African erstwhile students who have gone on to study or to be promoted to positions in hospital services which given them an element of confidence to speak. They are always eager to get feedback on their performance, as well as the content of their talks, which from experience, is the only way to learn. This may be the only way we can share education for some time to come, but the motivation that it brings, to be able to at least share some of our knowledge is important to each of us and to the charity. We look forward to the next event and to planning ahead for 2022 events.
